### Sickness reporting

If your child is unwell, please telephone the school the first morning of their absence; we have a dedicated telephone line where you can leave a message. If your child is unwell in the morning but then perks up, please bring them into school, they will then get their afternoon mark.

### Late in the mornings

This has become a problem again, in many of the Classes. It is extremely disruptive when children are late for the following reasons:

1. They miss the vitally important introduction to the day's learning
2. The Teacher has to get the Register back out to record the late mark (this stops them from teaching)
3. The Dinner register has to be changed (this stops the teacher from teaching)
4. Miss Jenkins/ Mrs Chivers/ Mrs Mills has to leave the Office to escort children to their Classroom, particularly if they are in the Foundation Phase. This leaves the Office unstaffed; the telephone and door unanswered and important administration work interrupted.
5. Some children receive additional learning interventions from the Teaching Assistants, these begin at 8.55, your child would then miss these short but very important daily sessions. They cannot be rescheduled as the Teaching Assistants work to very tight timetables.



**Most importantly they miss out on valuable learning opportunities and, they are often very embarrassed if they are regularly late.**

### Safer Internet Day

Use the questions below to help start discussions about how we can all use the internet safely, respectfully, responsibly, and positively when gaming and spending time online.

#### Start the conversation on a positive note:

- ① What do you like most about the internet and why?
- ① How do you have fun using the internet and technology?
- ① What's your favourite game, app or website?
- ① How does going online make you feel?
- ① How does the internet and technology make your life better?
- ① Do you most enjoy going online alone, or with other people?



#### Talk about relationships and communicating online:

- ① Who do you communicate with online? What different methods do you use to communicate online? (E.g. in-game chat, video calls, group chats, etc.)
- ① What is good about communicating online?
- ① What can be challenging about communicating online?
- ① What is different about talking to someone online compared to talking face to face?
- ① How much can you trust people you only know online?
- ① What do you and your friends do to keep yourselves safe and happy, when you are chatting and communicating online?

### Talk about respect online:

- ② What does respect mean to you? What does it look like online?
- ② What does disrespect look like online?
- ② What makes a good friend online?
- ② What can you do if you fall out with a friend online?
- ② Do people disagree more online or offline? Why do you think that is?
- ② What could you do if someone you were talking to online was unkind to you, or made you feel worried, upset, or uncomfortable?



### Talk about looking after yourself and others online:

- ② How do you stay safe online? What tips do you have and where did you learn them?
- ② Do you know where to go for help and where to find the safety tools on your favourite apps and games?
- ② What could you do if being online is making you feel worse rather than better?
- ② What could you do if you saw that a friend online needed some help or support?

Next, we created our own footprints with the help of a partner. There was **fantastic teamwork**, **careful drawing**, and **impressive cutting skills** on display as everyone worked together.



After that, we began placing our footprints inside the giant T-Rex footprint to see how many would fit. It was a fun, way to explore size, measurement, and estimation — and we were amazed by the results! It took **70** of our footprints to fill the Tyrannosaurus Rex footprint!

As part of our Forces Topic the children have been investigating gravity, weight and mass. They have been weighing objects in Newtons and converting them into Grams.



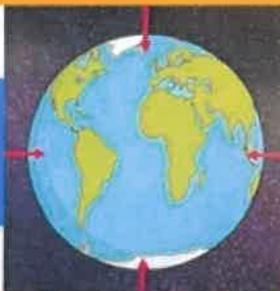
**Gravity is a Force**

Gravity is an invisible force that pulls everything towards the centre of Earth.

It feels like it is pulling 'down', but that's because wherever you are on Earth, it is pulling you 'down' towards Earth. Your feet are still on the ground in Australia and, because of gravity, 'down' feels the same wherever you are on Earth.

Gravity is measured in metres per second squared ( $m/s^2$ ).

What is Earth's gravity? Earth's gravity is  $9.8m/s^2$



# CODING WITH PYTHON IN CLASS 5

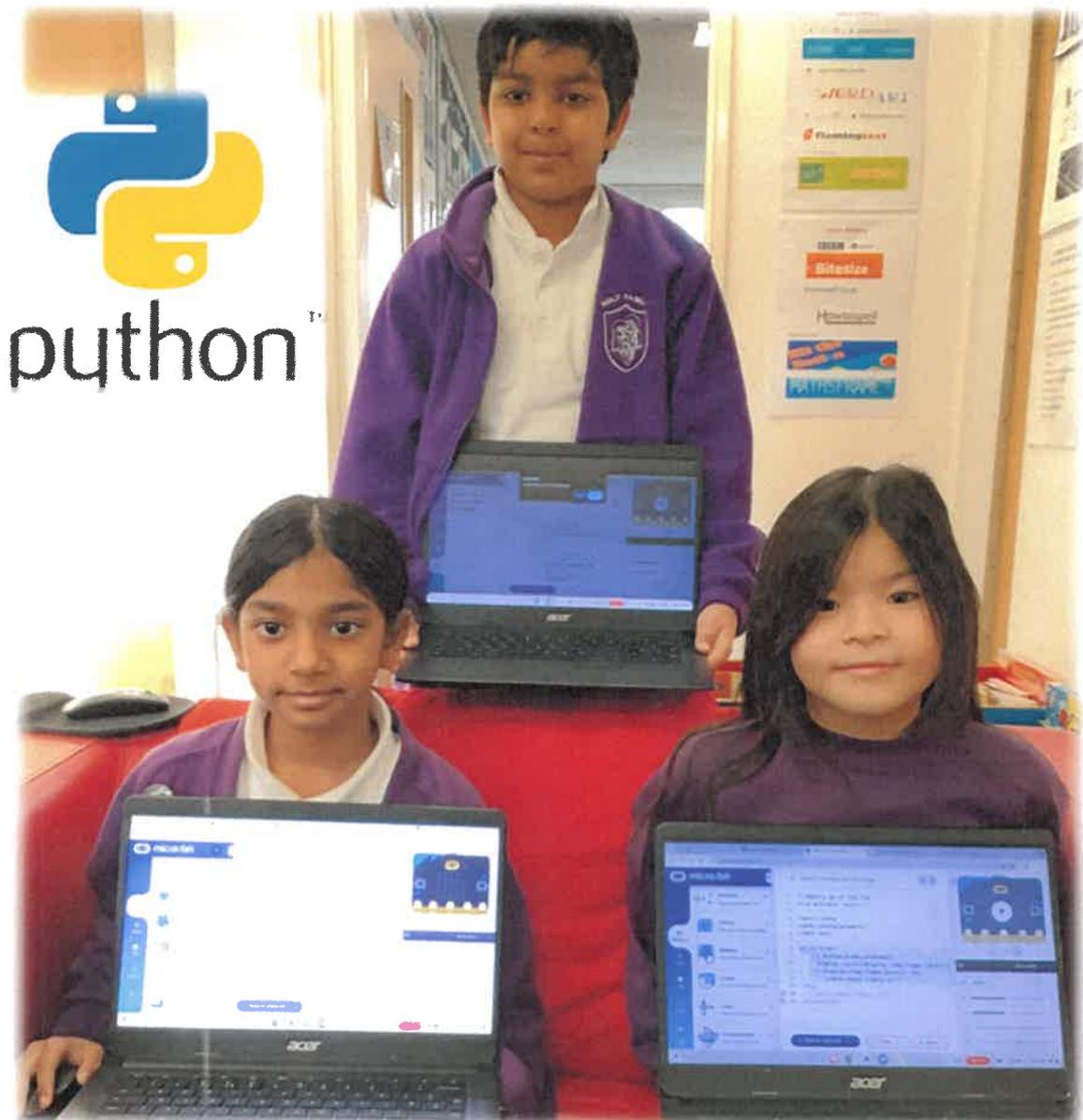
Class 5 have returned to text – based algorithms this half term using Python. We coded micro – bits to work as a step counter or to flash emojis on the LED lights. We did this previously in the autumn term but using block code. Python is far more advanced and took a great deal of care and concentration to avoid syntax errors. We learned which were the most common bugs and how to fix them (usually indents, colons and brackets).

# MODS



# S ROCKERS

## DEFINITION

60s Mods were a stylish British youth subculture focused on sharp fashion modern jazz and soul music. They were seen riding Italian scooters (Vespa/Lambretta) and these were symbols of post-austerity freedom, defining a new, aspirational teenage identity with all-night clubbing and a clean, futuristic vision that rebelled against the older generation. They prioritized looking sharp, staying current (hence "Modernists"), and enjoyed more disposable income than their parents, spending it on style, music, and transport.

## Fashion

60s Mod fashion was a sharp, clean-cut, and modern style originating from London's "modernist" youth, featuring slim-cut suits, narrow lapels for men, paired with button-down shirts and loafers. Women embraced bold shift dresses, miniskirts (Mary Quant), bright colours, geometric prints, and go-go boots. Fashion was designed for youthful energy and urban sophistication, incorporating new synthetic materials and Italian-inspired tailoring.

## Definition?

Rockers wore black leather jackets (often decorated with studs), blue jeans, and motorcycle boots. They wore their hair in a "greased-back" style.

They loved to ride high-speed British motorcycles, such as Triumphs. They often customized their bikes to look like racing bikes and loved going fast, aiming to reach 100 mph (known as doing "the ton").

## Fashion

60s Roker fashion, often contrasted with Mods. They emphasized tough, motorcycling style by wearing black leather jackets (studded/patched), drainpipe jeans, white T-shirts, Chelsea boots or brothel creepers, and greased-back hair ("greaser" look) with Brylcreem.

## Music

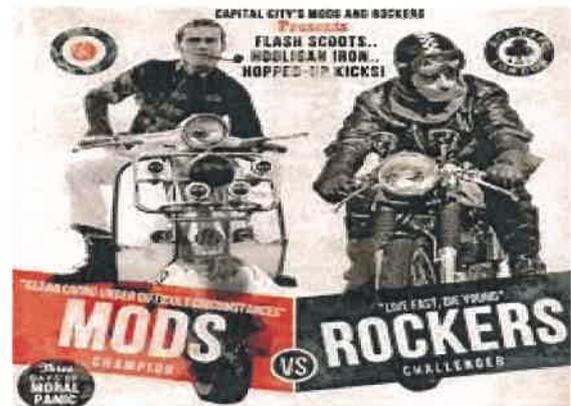
Sharp, stylish, and loud—60s mod music was the definitive soundtrack for a subculture obsessed with Italian scooters, French fashion, and American R&B. Emerging in London, it was a high-energy blend of imported sounds and homegrown rebellion.

## Background

While the mods were looking towards the future of fashion and soul, 60s rockers were fiercely loyal to the raw, leather-clad energy of 1950s rock and roll. For a rocker, it wasn't about the latest trend; it was about the speed of a Triumph motorcycle and the power of a jukebox.

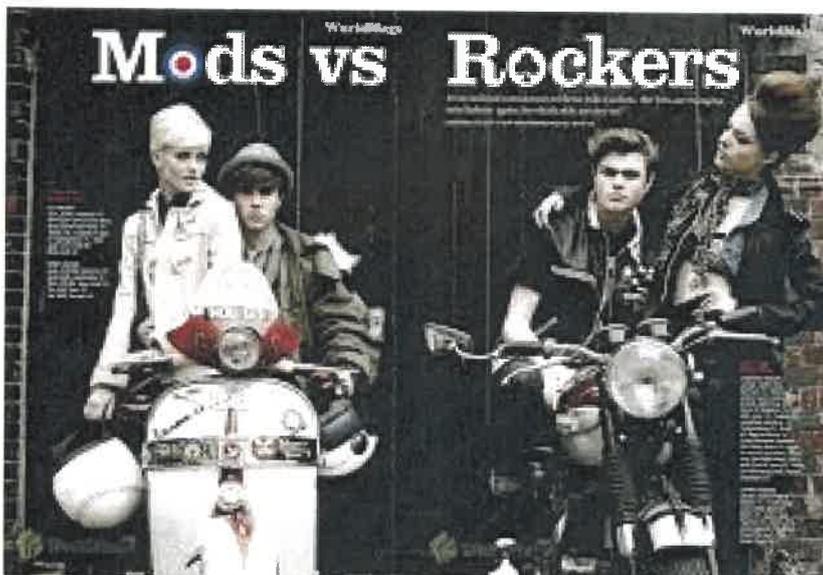
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## Background

While the mods were chasing the "new," the Rockers were a rebellion built on leather, grease, and high-speed steel. Born out of the 1950s "Ton-Up Boys" culture, they were the gritty, oil-stained antithesis to the polished mod aesthetic.



Mods and Rockers presented different styles, music, cultures and interests. They were in competition with each other and their differences often created clashes or physical battles.
